A Humble Proposal for a Season of Fasting

In the Ash Wednesday bidding to the observance of a holy Lent, the Prayer Book calls us to “a season of penitence and fasting”. Like many, my first association with the term “fasting” was of giving up something, e.g., chocolate, a glass of wine at dinner, etc. One year when I was in Divinity School my roommate and I even tried a literal “fast” from eating one day a week. My memory of that year’s practice is not one of great spiritual awakening or uplift, but rather how at midnight we couldn’t wait to “break” our fast.

I recently got a new perspective on fasting from Br. Curtis Almquist of the Society of St. John the Evangelist. Writing on Shrove Tuesday, Br. Curtis noted that our word “fast” comes from the old English *faesten* which means “firm”, such as to hold fast to some principle or decision. Br. Curtis goes on to note that the biblical understanding of fasting is “more an affirmation of some principle rather than a renunciation of some desire”. He then suggests a very different kind of fast, writing, “You may find in Lent the invitation not only to do something less, but also to do something more with your time or attention or money.” You might hold fast to a daily resolve to practice some act of kindness or generosity with your family, friends, or even strangers.

Shortly before I read Br. Curtis’ words on fasting, I received what I thought was just another piece of junk mail. Addressed to Cleveland Religious Leaders, the letter was titled, “From Cleveland to *Kindland*”. Having been retired for several years now, I am not usually a recipient of such letters anymore but before I tossed it in the “circular file”, I gave it a quick glance.

In the wake of our most recent election and the January 6 insurrection at the U.S. Capital, I resonated with the opening sentence of the letter, “No doubt you are concerned about the uprise of toxicity and negativity seen throughout our country and community and, like everyone, you are searching for answers.” On a daily basis we are deluged with media from all sides telling us what isn’t working in our country or trying to score points against others. However, closer to home, on any given day hundreds of thousands of acts of kindness are being performed in our communities. Few of these acts of kindness are made known to others so they can serve as inspiration to others and change the culture of our community.

The goal of Kindland is to engrain kindness throughout Greater Cleveland through its school, businesses, churches, synagogues, mosques, cities, and general public. This is accomplished by encouraging people to REPORT acts of kindness on social media (@BeKindland) using the unifying hashtag #Kindland and asking community members to take the Kindland pledge at www.bekindland.com. The goal of the Kindland organizers is to document 1,000,000 acts of kindness by the end of 2021.

When Henry James was saying goodbye once to his young nephew Billy, his brother William’s son, he said something that the boy never forgot. “There are three things that are important in human life. The first is to be kind. The second is to be kind. The third is to be kind.” Commenting on James’ advice, Frederick Buechner writes, “Be kind because although kindness is not by a long shot the same thing as holiness, kindness is one of the doors that holiness enters the world through, enters us through....”

Perhaps you have already established a Lenten discipline that works for you. If so, by all means keep practicing it. However, if you might still be looking for such a discipline, let me commend practicing some act of kindness or generosity with your spouse or partner, with colleagues or neighbors or family members, even strangers. What if you wrote a letter to a different person every day in Lent? Simply let them know you are thinking of them, that he or she matters, that you care for them and think of them in your prayers. And visit the website BeKindland.com. and learn how you can report acts of kindness to the wider community so that Cleveland becomes synonymous with Kindland. In so doing you can “hold fast” to a meaningful Lenten discipline and start a snowball of kindness rolling downhill until it becomes visible to people near and far and a sign of hope that inspires others to be kind and generous, too.

SANDRA REDMOND

She started the first preschool program for Beachwood City Schools, then moved into teacher education, chairing the Early Childhood Education Department for Cuyahoga Community College, and finally directing the Children’s Museum of Cleveland in its last days at University Circle.

Worship through the years has been within our Episcopal Diocese at St. Paul’s, Christ Church, Trinity Cathedral, and, for the last several years, finding a spiritual home at St. Christopher’s.

VESTRY MINUTES

JANUARY 28, 2021

Present: Mother Ann Kidder, Elise Bennett, Charley Marston, Judy Holmes, Becky Everett, Jim Pender, Mary Murray, Mary Holmes, Sean McMillion, Tom Matthews

The meeting came to order at 6:05 pm. Mother Ann opened the meeting with a prayer.

Review of the December 10th meeting minutes was the first order of business. Becky E. moved to approve, Charley M. seconded, a vote was taken and the motion passed. Approval of January 13th special meeting minutes was the next order of business. Mary M. moved to approve, Becky E. seconded, a vote was taken and the motion passed.

Approval of the Letter of Agreement between the Vestry and the Reverend Richard Israel was the next order of business. Tom M. moved to approve, Mary H. seconded, a vote was taken, and the motion passed.

Approval of the Housing Allowance Resolution for the Reverend Richard Israel was the 4th order of business.

For the following resolution, Becky E. moved to approve, Charley M. seconded, a vote was taken and passed.

WHEREAS The Rev. Richard Israel is employed as a minister of the Gospel by the Episcopal Church of St. Christopher by-the-River, which does not provide a residence for him; the Vestry of St. Christopher by-the-River resolves that of the total annual compensation of \$9,000.00 to be paid to The Rev. Richard Israel during the year 2021, \$9,000.00 is to be designated a housing allowance within the meaning of that term as used in Section 107 of the IRS Code of 1986.

The Treasurer's 2020 End of the Year Budget and proposed 2021 Budget Report was the next order of business. Mary M. was in attendance and lead the discussion.

- Through 2020, pledge receipts were off but expenses were well controlled, resulting in a \$35,220 net deficit for the year without applying the PPP loan and SBA grant. Since the PPP loan and SBA grant have not been formally forgiven, the combined \$50,800 will continue to be carried as a loan. Once forgiveness is received, the \$50,800 will be recognized as revenue. Additionally, there were \$13k of 2020 pledges that were received in January 2021 which will be accounted in the 2021 financials.
- The 2021 Budget Proposal was built up from 2020 actual expenses in combination with estimate guidance from the Senior and Junior Wardens. Details for the 2021 pledge estimate were discussed as well as rationale for other 2021 expense estimates. The proposal provided receipts of \$379,042, expenses of \$408,682 and a \$29,640 net deficit not including the PPP/SBA funds. Once the \$50,800 is forgiven and taken into income, a surplus of \$21,160 is projected. Charley M. moved to approve the proposed 2021 budget, Mary H. seconded, a vote was taken and the 2021 Budget Proposal passed.

For the Stewardship Update, Mary H. mentioned there has been good progress for the Task Force to review the Pre-K school opportunity. Parrish and Community members have been selected and the first meeting is scheduled for January 29th. Mary mentioned no funds are anticipated for the Task Force review.

Mother Ann then reviewed the Plans for the Virtual Annual Meeting.

- The Annual Report will be included in the next Newsletter
- Flocknotes will be used to get the planned attendance.
- The meeting will be held via Zoom.
- Voting will be done during the Zoom meeting and minutes will be taken.

There was a discussion of proposals on how to get votes for those who are known that can not attend.

The next Vestry meeting is February 25th, 2021 at 6pm. The Annual meeting will be Sunday February 28th, 2021 at 10am. Mother Ann then led a closing prayer. The meeting was adjourned at 7:35PM.


