Minutes of the 2020 Annual Meeting of The Parish of St. Christopher by-the-River
Held via Zoom on February 28, 2021

The Annual Meeting of St. Christopher's by-the-River was called to order by Mother Ann and meeting came to order at 10:05am. The meeting was being held in virtual format via Zoom meetings. Mother Ann then led a prayer.

Mother Ann confirmed a quorum of 32 electors in attendance as well as 3 clergy. She then noted that Tom Matthews was in attendance and as Clerk would take the meeting minutes.

The first order of business was approval of the 2019 Annual Meeting Minutes. Charley Marston motioned to approve, John Irwin seconded, a vote was taken, and the motion passed.

Mother Ann introduced Father Richard Israel to the attendees and provided time for Father Rich to review past connections with St. Christopher and thoughts for his upcoming sabbatical coverage.

Mother Ann recognized and thanked the offgoing vestry members - Mary Murray, Becky Everett, and Jim Pender. Mother Ann then stated that Mary Murray will continue as Treasurer and Becky Everett was willing to serve for another term.

He then stated the Committee nominates Sandra Redmond, Becky Everett, and Ron Lee to be elected to the Vestry for three year terms. Charley also nominated Laura Cotton to be the NEMAC 2021-2022 representative from the Parrish.

Mother Ann closed the nominations and clarified that the vote would be for the slate of provided nominees.

Mary Holmes made a motion to approve the provided nominees, Mary Murray seconded, a vote was taken and the motion passed.

Charley Marston, Sr. Warden, thanked the congregation for their service and support in this challenging year.

John Irwin echoed the comments of appreciation and thanks and mentioned he was looking forward to parish services and personal get togethers.

Mother Ann thanked the parish and staff for their service and called for close to the meeting.

FAITH DEVELOPMENT REPORT

The past year was one of uncertainty and continuous adjustment and challenges for the world, including our own church school. As we followed the recommended precautions to keep our children and families safe during the pandemic, we moved to Zoom sessions on Sundays with Children's services. These were led by Peggy Reda with visits by Mother Ann and Father Rich Israel. A concern for everyone's health and safety and the extremely low attendance at the Zoom sessions pushed us to try something else. The Zoom-weary children (from school) and the focus of many parents on their online job obligations made for reluctant Zoom participants every Sunday.

We then tried mailing activity packets to the children to coincide with the church seasons and a Kids' Newsletter. Attempts to activate responses to fun projects such as letters to God or to submit activity sheets for prizes were not successful.

The limited energy level and, perhaps, the difficulty in achieving enthusiasm without social contact and weekly togetherness took a toll on the faith development of our children, as well as on the world's adults.

In our isolation and our separation from one another we have tried to ensure that the children's relationship with Christ somehow continues, if not grows. The most important element remains above all that the children know that they are loved by God.

We have sent individual cards for each of the holidays to, hopefully, most of the children - just to remind them that their parish family misses them and loves them.

Our Nursery has continued with Miss Melanie Reda most Sundays, but attendance here has also been minimal.

Mother Ann, the vestry and church school staff are committed to Church School and with fervent prayer, to the faith development of all the children. We hope for in-class Church School! There are 20-25+ young Christians for us to strengthen in their faith! Let us pray for strength, courage, wisdom and the love of our Lord as we move into a new year.

So to those curious future individuals I offer my greetings from February 2022 Anno Domini. Our Covid 19 viral worldwide pandemic continues. The year 2021 began where we left off - no in person services. Mother Ann, John Irwin and our Deacon, Lydia Bailey, recorded services along with music by Yuri and John McElliot. The annual meeting was held virtually with parishioners joining in on the internet (ZOOM). We offered our heartfelt thanks to two terrific vestry members, Jim Pender and Mary Murray, who stepped down after six years of dedicated service. With the unanimous vote of the congregation, Ronald Lee and Sandra Redmond took their place and we were pleased that Becky Everett continued on the vestry as our Jr. Warden.

March 1st marked the beginning of Mother Ann's well deserved three month sabbatical. We welcomed Father Richard Israel as our spiritual leader. He had recently retired from his position as Associate Rector at St Paul's Episcopal church. While he began with our "physical distancing" programs, as the number of new illnesses in the area declined and the weather warmed we were able to gather outside for lovely Morning Prayer services. Everyone agreed that Father Richard was a perfect fit and we are grateful that he brought his charm and his theological brilliance to fill in Mother Ann's absence and again several times later in the year.

On June 1st. Mother Ann returned and we continued our outdoor services until it became too hot and then moved inside. OUTREACH AT LUTHERAN METROPOLITAN MINISTRY

Several hardy parishioners were onsite at one of LMM's affordable homes, cleaning the home in preparation for a family moving in, transitioning out of homelessness.

A Lenten retreat looking at the collection of the Cleveland Museum of Art went on via ZOOM in 2021 with wonderful sharing by parishioners, in spite of the online format. I am looking forward to an in-person Lenten Art Retreat at CMA in 2022!

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

It is with the greatest pleasure that I have been able to serve as your Junior Warden this past year. Having the support of our outstanding Rector, Senior Warden, and Vestry as well as the support of the parishioners has meant the world to me!

2021 started out relatively quietly as we were still in remote church service mode due to Covid 19. By the middle of April, our interim priest, Rich Israel, and the vestry determined it was safe to resume in person worship outside. With the great care Luis gives to our grounds, services outside in the side yard as well as the front yard became a reality. When services moved indoors later in the year, the building was ready, and we enjoyed indoor services with masks.

Normal operations continued the rest of the summer and early Fall with the completion of all our annual inspections and normal HVAC maintenance. We replaced some sprinkler heads in the fellowship hall as well as the antifreeze in the sprinkler system. The carpeting in the Guild room as well as the sanctuary was cleaned and protected. Luis added insulation around the outside doors to conserve heat in the winter, and he completed some general painting maintenance.

In late fall, early winter, two heat pumps for the boiler were repaired. The ceiling in the fellowship hall kitchen developed a crack and threatened to collapse. David Novak and his crew are in the process of replacing the entire kitchen ceiling as well as improving the heating pipes in the ceiling.

In early January, the sewer system developed a clog which caused a sewage back up at the house next door to the church. This problem was addressed and we are taking the necessary steps to ensure this doesn't happen again.

At our January Vestry, The Vestry unanimously voted to purchase and install a generator for the rectory which will take place within the next couple of months. In addition, it has come to my attention that the squirrels, who have been running around in the attic, crawl spaces and walls of the rectory for some time, need to be removed. Proof of this came with two squirrels finding their way into the interior of the rectory in February which resulted in our trapper coming once to retrieve one from the downstairs shower stall, and Luis blocking off the opening in a cupboard which another clever squirrel had discovered. This project will need to be addressed by the next Junior Warden and completed in a timely fashion. I am very thankful for Mother Ann's patience and tolerance for the squirrels' invasion over the years and apologize for her having to endure this at all!

I am completing my third year as your Junior Warden, but I feel there is other work to which the Holy Spirit is leading me. Therefore, it is with a grateful heart that I am stepping down from my role as Junior Warden, but will continue the two more years of my term on the vestry. I would like to thank both the Senior Wardens with whom I worked, John Irwin and Charley Marston, as well as our fearless leader, Mother Ann, for all their support and advice. I would also like to thank the Vestry and all of you for the confidence you placed in me during my time as Junior Warden. I believe I am leaving this role having accomplished a number of improvements around St. Christopher's, and I have every confidence that the next Junior Warden will face this role with as much energy and dedication as I did.

In accordance with the spending policy for the year 2021, the Fund *distributed a total of \$130,942* to St. Christopher by-the-River's operating funds. Distributions are made on a quarterly basis.

2022 STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Stewardship is a profound idea. It seems to me to be the fundamental relationship we have with our faith: the responsibility to grow and keep safe the treasure of God's grace without having control over its future. The parishioners of St. Christopher's have shown their commitment to this responsibility in their continued financial support of the church in 2022.

During the 2022 campaign, "Open arms, Open doors", 79 families made pledges or gifts to support this year's budget. Even during this time of uncertainty where many weeks we could not worship together in person, many people increased their gifts. This is the kind of parish we are, hopeful, committed stewards of our time and treasure.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As we worked and worshipped through our second pandemic-constrained year, pledge and plate receipts for 2021 increased to \$233 thousand, or 6% above 2020's collections and slightly above the budgeted amount. While this total remains 6% below the pre-pandemic year 2019, it does not reflect a significant increase in other gifts, most notably a large bequest which the Vestry has elected to use to establish a fund that will be available to supplement receipts in coming years. The other notable "receipt" is the forgiveness by the Small Business Administration of the \$43 thousand PPP loan St. Christophers was granted in early 2020. This is an accounting entry only, but it does reduce the liability that we had previously reported; without the PPP impact, total receipts were \$382 thousand and very close to budget. Expenses have remained tightly controlled and appear to be slightly reduced from the prior year, although much of the difference can be attributed to payroll timing. We did not make reductions in our largest expense category of salaries and benefits but have continued to look for savings in other areas. Our total expenses were \$391 thousand. Excluding the PPP accounting impact, St. Christophers experienced a deficit of \$8 thousand.

Our balance sheet has long been a source of strength for St. Christophers to weather the volatility of the economy and of our small parish where a small number of deaths or people moving out of town can have an outsized impact. The improvement in our already strong cash position at year end is based on the \$100,000 bequest noted above, \$70 thousand of pledges for 2022 that were prepaid in 2021, other special gifts and a favorable investment market.

The Covid pandemic certainly altered the way the Women's Guild operates. In the past two years, we have cancelled three Bargain Box sales, most of our Board Meetings and monthly programs and several outreach projects.

We did at last hold a fall Bargain Box in September which was very successful (see our financial report). It was well attended and staffed by many volunteers. We were able to disperse \$15,200 to our usual outreach organizations. It was decided by the Board that moving forward, there will only be one Bargain Box per year, being held in the fall.

In addition, we filled 35 backpacks with health and personal items for St. Luke's Church. We provided \$621 for this project.

We also had a delicious Christmas lunch for the Board catered by our own Laura Cotton.

We pray for better times ahead.


January 2022 Meeting
